ANZAC Day Commemorations 2020

As I am sure you have now heard, very unfortunately, in light of COVID-19, all Anzac Day commemorations have been cancelled. With this in mind, and the health of our CBers, which is paramount, I am sad to say that our CB Anzac Day Reunion Lunch will not be going ahead this year. Our Reunion Lunch is always a highlight on the calendar of our Association, so it is a big blow, but we do, however, very much hope to be able to arrange a lovely CB get together later in the year around Remembrance Day. For your reference, the official statement from the RSL regarding Anzac Day 2020 is below:

FOLLOWING UPDATES FROM THE NSW GOVERNMENT, RSL NSW HAS TAKEN THE DIFFICULT DECISION TO CANCEL ALL PUBLIC ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATION SERVICES ACROSS THE STATE. ACTING STATE PRESIDENT RAY JAMES HAS ADVISED THAT THE RISK TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC AND OUR SUB-BRANCHES IS TOO GREAT.

GIVEN THE SIGNIFICANT CONCERNS AROUND THE SPREAD OF COVID-19, WE SIMPLY CANNOT ALLOW SUCH LARGE GATHERINGS AS WE SEE EACH YEAR ON ANZAC DAY TO GO AHEAD. THIS IS NOT A DECISION WE HAVE TAKEN LIGHTLY. THE RSL HAS A RESPONSIBILITY TO ACT IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF VETERANS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC.

THIS IMPACTS THE ANZAC DAY MARCH, CONSULAR STAR CEREMONY, COMMEMORATION SERVICE AND SUNSET SERVICE.

WHILE THESE TRADITIONAL COMMEMORATIVE SERVICES WILL NO LONGER GO AHEAD, ANZAC DAY IS STILL A DAY OF RECOGNITION AND FOR MANY AUSTRALIANS, THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY IN OUR COMMEMORATIVE CALENDAR.

ANZAC DAY AS A MARKER OF OUR RESPECT AND ADMIRATION FOR ANZACS PAST AND PRESENT WILL STILL BE OBSERVED SAID RAY JAMES. EXACTLY WHAT FORM THIS WILL TAKE WILL BE DIFFERENT FROM PREVIOUS YEARS, BUT AS CUSTODIANS OF COMMEMORATION, THE RSL WILL STILL HONOUR THE SERVICE AND SACRIFICE OF OUR BRAVE SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN. IN THESE CHALLENGING TIMES, WE WILL REMEMBER THEM.

ANZAC Commemoration Service in Canberra

Please be aware of the modified arrangements for this year's Commemoration at the Australian War Memorial. In light of the COVID-19 pandemic the Memorial will hold a private, nationally televised, ANZAC Day commemorative service. The traditional Dawn Service, National Ceremony and Veterans' march will not take place.

The revised service will be held in the Commemorative Area and Hall of Memory at 5.30 a.m. on ANZAC Day. It is anticipated dignitaries representing the Commonwealth of Australia, New Zealand, current and former serving veterans will attend. This event will not be open to the public but will be broadcast live across Australia by the ABC and streamed online.

So could I encourage you to make the effort to watch it live on the ABC, or, if you have the technology, stream it to your TV or computer.

On behalf of the Committee, I wish all CBers, their friends and families, a happy, safe and healthy ANZAC Day, during which we can reflect and remember those in our Defence Forces, both long ago, and in the present, who have served and sacrificed so we have the freedom that is ours today.

I am Valerie, wife of Keith Falconer "ZerO".

Oh how I wish Keith was here today he could answer my questions in a flash.

Geraldine Cole's article about the Plaque and Casuarina tree at The Shrine in Melbourne - I was there when they planted the tree.

It all came about through Roy Ward, a Victorian politician at the time. (Somewhere here in my house are photos of all that were there as well as the date.)

At this moment, where the tree and plaque are and all the side of The Shrine is covered in scaffolding and will be till about 2022 when our newest underground in Melbourne will join many suburbs.

Keith photographed everything that was important in our lives and I can still see us standing in the freezing cold planting the tree. Roy Ward knew the right people which is how the tree was planted - it is not something that they did for everyone.

The Shrine in Melbourne is to us in Melbourne like the War Memorial in Canberra. I was a bit shocked where Geraldine said the overgrown grass needed a haircut and she would recruit her family in Melbourne to tidy it up a little.

It is really sacred property.

So my next project is to climb up to the top of our library at home, where all our 150 photo albums are, and find the photos and the dates of who was there. (The library is 9ft tall) Of course I know most who were there but they have all died including my wonderful Keith.

Now I think Geraldine's Father was Jock McCorkell, the famous North Melbourne Footballer. He was a star for many years and he died on 29th March 1987. I will call into the Shrine if I find the date and the photos and see Rebecca Dixon. The Shrine staff were the people that gave permission for the piece of land for CBICA Melbourne to use.

Keith talked about everyone who was a member of the Melbourne CBICA and he was President for many years. Then Roy Ward took over. I never recall hearing Jock McCorkell's name as a member although I had 32 years with Keith talking about the War etc. I am just back from 5 months in Vietnam so I am not in Australia much . If I find proof of the tree planting, I will send it to you.

WE WILL BE TRAVELLING AUSTRALIA AND FILMING THROUGH FEBRUARY, MARCH AND APRIL AND WOULD LOVE TO INTERVIEW INTERESTED MEMBERS OF CENTRAL BUREAU.

I'M SO GLAD EVERYONE IS EXCITED ABOUT THE DOCUMENTARY AND THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR PUTTING WORD OUT THERE WITH THE VETERAN MEMBERS. WE ARE KEEN TO CHAT WITH MEN AND WOMEN, AS WELL AS ANY FAMILY MEMBERS WHOSE PARENT IS NO LONGER WITH US. WE WOULD LIKE THEM TO CONTACT ME AS WELL. WE'D LIKE THEIR PERSPECTIVE ABOUT HOW THEY FELT WHEN THEY FOUND OUT ABOUT WHAT THEIR PARENT/GRANDPARENT DID WITH CENTRAL BUREAU OR IF THEY HAVE ANY STORIES THEY CAN RELATE TO US ABOUT THEIR PARENTS/GRANDPARENTS. WE ARE HOPING TO WORK FROM LOTS OF DIFFERENT ANGLES.

If you feel you can contribute to this amazing work, we encourage you to contact Alli. She is willing to visit. In fact Alli has already visited two of our marvellous Veterans, and both visits have been extremely rewarding for all parties.

This is a wonderful opportunity to promote the amazing story of CB!

I CAN'T GIVE YOU ANY GUARANTEES ABOUT MY PROJECT AS IT'S IN EARLY STAGES AT THE MOMENT, BUT I CAN TELL YOU MY BROAD IDEAS. AT THE MOMENT, I HAVE THREE MAIN IDEAS:

- 1. TO RECORD THE STORIES OF THESE MEN AND WOMEN WHILE THEY ARE STILL HERE TO VOICE THEIR OWN STORIES. I REALISE THIS IS TIME-SENSITIVE AND I WORRY THEIR STORIES WILL BE LOST AS THEY AGE. I WOULD LOVE THIS TO BECOME A BOOK, HOWEVER THAT WOULD DEPEND ON THE NUMBER OF MEN AND WOMEN I FIND AND ALSO A PUBLISHER!
- 2. To video these interviews so we have a living memory. I would love this to be used to inform Australia about the work of these remarkable people, e.g. to become part of a museum exhibition or even a documentary where we see these Veterans telling their own stories. Again, that is a dream at this stage. A colleague of mine who makes videos is as excited about this project as I am and would love to film the interviews. This will ensure we have a permanent record.
- 3. To write a novel that would engage the current generation of students, particularly girls. This would be historical fiction, with fictional characters informed by real life events of course. The novel would be aimed at young adults. The world wars are a compulsory part of the Australian Curriculum for students in years 9 and 10 and I think this would really help to engage students in this history.

Again, these are the ideas I have at the moment, perhaps some of these ideas could be merged, perhaps there is a better idea. I hope to apply for a grant or residency to further my project.

I WAS SO SURPRISED, AND DELIGHTED, TO LEARN OF THE EXISTENCE OF THE INTELLIGENCE BUREAU RECENTLY, AND TO HEAR THEY WERE SECRET FOR SO LONG. (BLETCHLEY PARK HAS BEEN KNOWN ABOUT FOR A WHILE.) I THINK THIS IS A STORY THAT DESERVES TO BE TOLD. I REALISE THERE HAS BEEN SOME INFORMATION PUBLISHED. THE DIFFERENCE IN WHAT I PROPOSE IS THAT I WOULD LIKE TO FOCUS ON WOMEN AND WORLD WAR II.

I REALISE SOME OF THESE PEOPLE ARE IN SYDNEY. I GREW UP IN ST IVES, SYDNEY, SO AM A REGULAR VISITOR. THANKS VERY MUCH FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION. I LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING FROM YOU,



CAPTAIN STAN CLARKE, THE AUSTRALIAN HEAD OF TRAFFIC ANALYSIS, TRAVELLED TO CONFERENCES AT BLETCHLEY PARK AND ARLINGTON HALL ON THE WAY BACK; BY AIR AND SEA IN AN ODYSSEY OVER SEVERAL WEEKS IN APRIL 1944. SOMETIMES IN THE UNPRESSURISED BOMB BAY OF A B-24 LIBERATOR BOMBER.
